





FEATURED SPEAKERS

Cynthia Bowen, FAICP is the director of planning for Rundell Ernstberger Associates (REA), a national planning, urban design, and land architect firm founded in 1979. An active APA member, Bowen has held a number of leadership positions including president of the APA Indiana Chapter and vice chair and secretary/treasurer of the Chapter Presidents Council. Bowen is a graduate of Ball State University with degrees in urban and regional planning and environmental science and design. Within her community, Bowen has served on many boards and committees.





Robert Lang is a nationally recognized authority on urban growth, economic development and population dynamics, including the interplay between politics and growth in the American West. Lang's research specialties include suburban studies, real estate, demographic and spatial analysis, economic development, and metropolitan policy. He has authored over 150 academic and professional publications and has developed many new urban planning concepts such as "Boomburbs," "Edgeless Cities," and "Megapolitan Areas." His book, *Megapolitan America*, details the rise of megapolitan areas and how they will change how America plans. Lang is a professor in the Greenspun College of Urban Affairs and serves as the Executive Director of The Lincy Institute & Brookings Mountain West at UNLV. He is also a Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institution in Washington, D.C. Lang earned a Ph.D. in urban sociology from Rutgers University.

Arthur C. (Christian "Chris") Nelson, FAcSS, FAICP has made significant contributions to the fields of: real estate analysis including the role of changing demographics in shifting long-term real estate development trends; urban growth management and open space preservation, central city revitalization; infrastructure financing; planning effectiveness; transportation and land use outcomes; metropolitan development patterns; the economic effects of facility location; the role of suburban redevelopment in reshaping metropolitan America; and the new "megapolitan" geography of the United States. Dr. Nelson is currently Professor of Urban Planning and Real Estate Development at the University of Arizona. He is also Presidential Professor Emeritus of City & Metropolitan Planning at the University of Utah where, from 2008-2014, he served as founding Director of the Metropolitan Research Center, Adjunct Professor of Finance in the David Eccles School of Business, and founding Director of the Master of Real Estate Development program.





Jeremy Aguero is a principal analyst with Applied Analysis, a leading economic, fiscal and policy research firm based in Las Vegas, Nevada. A fourth-generation Las Vegan, Aguero undertook a special course of undergraduate study at UNLV under the late Dr. Shannon Bybee and graduated with honors from the William S. Boyd School of Law. He founded Applied Analysis in 1997. Since 2016, Aguero worked as the lead staff to the Southern Nevada Tourism Infrastructure Task Force and subsequently the Las Vegas Stadium Authority. His work was credited by Chairman Steve Hill, Governor Brian Sandoval, Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority President Rossi Ralenkotter and Oakland Raiders President Marc Badain as playing a key role in both the \$1.8-billion Raiders Stadium Project and the \$1.4 billion Las Vegas Convention Center Renovation and Expansion Project.

Mayor Carolyn G. Goodman became the mayor of the city of Las Vegas on July 6, 2011 and was re-elected in 2015. Among her priorities, Mayor Goodman has championed downtown development, improvement in inner-city schools, expansion of homeless resources, coordination among non-profit service providers, adoption of the Nevada film tax credit, and creation of the medical district and UNLV medical school. She represents the city on numerous boards and organizations and hold national leadership roles as a member of the US Conference of Mayors. Carolyn is well known in the Las Vegas community for founding The Meadows School in 1984, Nevada's first nonprofit, college preparatory school for pre-kindergarten through 12th grades.

Mayor Debra March has a proven track record of planning expertise and experience. Under her leadership, Henderson secured and managed a \$3.5 Million Sustainable Communities grant which created the first federally-recognized regional plan and better positioned Southern Nevada for investment. The resulting plan won a national APA award. Debra's background also includes service as a Park Ranger, Deputy Administrator with the Nevada Real Estate Division, and Director of UNLV's Lied Institute for Real Estate Studies. With a demonstrated passion for citizen involvement and sustainable community planning, Debra represented Henderson's Ward II since 2009 until being elected mayor in 2017.





Mayor Pro-Tem Pamela Goynes-Brown, a North Las Vegas resident since 1964, is the first African American woman to represent Ward 2. She was first elected on June 7, 2011 and is currently serving her second term. She is also the first African American woman in North Las Vegas to serve as Mayor Pro-Tempore. She is an assistant principal in the Clark County School District and has dedicated over 30 years to educating children in Southern Nevada. Mrs. Goynes-Brown holds a master's degree in elementary education from NOVA Southeastern University, with an endorsement in educational leadership. She also holds a bachelor's degree in music education from Prairie View A & M University, where she graduated Magna Cum Laude.

Elected to the Clark County Commission in 2006, **Chris Giunchigliani** was re-elected twice and currently holds the position of vice chair. Prior to serving on the County Commission, Chris worked as an educator for almost 30 years, also working as president of the Clark County and Nevada State Education Associations. She was elected to the Nevada State Assembly where she worked as a legislator for eight regular and five special sessions. As a legislator, Chris served as Speaker Pro Tempore and as chair of the Elections, Procedures and Ethics Committee, vice chair for the influential Ways & Means Committee and Growth & Infrastructure Committee. Throughout her career in public office, Chris has advocated for sound urban planning practices, housing options for all, complete communities, and mass transit.





A former three-term Mayor of Henderson and a practicing attorney in business and commercial law for more than 35 years, **Commissioner Jim Gibson** brings his extensive experience in local government to his role as County Commissioner in District G. While Mayor of Henderson, Gibson guided the city through a period of unprecedented growth as it became the second-largest city in Nevada. Among many other notable accomplishments, he was instrumental in updating the city's comprehensive plan, establishing the award-winning "Apple Partnership" K-3rd grade literacy program which has been adopted by the Clark County School District, and led the effort to establish Nevada State College.

Nevada faces one of the worst public health disparities in the U.S. This condition impacts the entire state, including both metropolitan areas, and perhaps more acutely, rural districts.
